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



"ADVENTURES in GENEALOGY"

CHRISTOPHER T. LOWTHER

All of us S.A.R. members have traced our ancestry to the American Revolutionary war period. Some of us have traced further to our european 'come-overer'. A few of us have looked into our early european roots. But all the way back to King Arthur! Chris Lowther is a truly gifted researcher. He has achieved a level of genealogical expertise few can claim and in both colonial America and England. And to add to his ability as a genealogist, Chris has published two books on the subject.

One of the advantages of on-site research is the acquiring the 'feel for the land' and to be able to envision, first hand, what ones ancestor's lives must have been like. A secondary benefit is the interesting people you meet and the incredibly strange situations you can get yourself into. This is particularly true when off the beaten track in England. Some of these personal experiences can only be described as "Adventures in Genealogy".







When President General Paul H. Walker visited California to attend the S.A.R.'s Annual Meeting of the Membership (our Chapter hosted the event) presented him with a unique gift. A "gorget" and a certificate making him an honorary Captain of our Color Guard. President General Walker has been an active participant in the Massachusetts Color Guard for over a decade.

The Gorget was engraved on the inside as follows:

THE "GORGET"

'In days of old, when knights were bold' and plate armor had just been invented, a method had to be found to protect the neck and at the same

time allow some mobility. A devise was invented, in France, which connected the helmet to the body armor and




permitted the helmet to rotate left and right. The devise was called a "Gorget".

Since only knights (the medieval equivalent to today's officers) wore plate armor, it became symbolic of their position. During the 17th Century armor was reduced to a breast and backplate and helmet, a gorget connecting the three.

Uniforms as we think of them today did not exist in the late 17th Century. An insignia was needed to distinguish the officers from the rank and file. The Gorget was selected. It was reduced in size, and generally was ornate. By the time of the American Revolution, every Officer in the British Army wore a Gorget, usually decorated with the officer's regimental emblem.

The gorget never attained much favor among American Officers, probably because of the lack of materials and the costs associated with such luxuries.

The British discontinued the use of the Gorget in 1831. The German Army continued the general use of the gorget through WWII and today, they still use the gorget, but now it denotes being in one of their elite armor units.


We will be heard in Phoenix, We will have a good time in

BULL THE BRUM

Foreword by Judson A. Grenier, Ph.D. Professor of History, California State University, Dominguez Hills

n 1862, in answer to an increasing need for a strong Union presence in secessionist-prone Southern California, the U. S. Army established a camp at Wilmington, near Banning's Wharf and San Pedro Harbor.

Named "Camp Drum" (later changed to Drum Barracks) in honor of Lt. Col. Richard C. Drum, assistant adjutant general of the Department of the Pacific, its story is now fully told in this new book by historian Don McDowell.

history of the camp from its beginnings as a bustling Civil War post from which troops, matériel and supplies were dispatched to frontier bases all over the Southwest, through abandonment by the military in 1871, conversion of some buildings to a college for a few years, use of the present building as a boarding house through two world wars, and concludes with the saving of the building from

demolition, and restoration to the lovely city museum it is today.

The people, personalities and events of Drum Barracks' colorful 130-year history are told in a highly readable style, supplemented by scores of photographs, maps and illustrations, creating an indispensable story for history buffs of the Civil War and Indian Wars in the Far West.

This first edition is issued in limited, numbered and signed hardcover with dust jacket, and in trade softcover. 6 by 9 inches, with over 200 pages on quality gloss stock, bibliography, and index.


