Marching Through History has a family-oriented, educa-

Visitors are invited to walk through the camps of the participants and learn about the lives of the common man or woman or of the great names in history through interpretive specialists. There are battle reenactments that demonstrate the technology of the times, and each encampment is an opportunity to walk back into time and relive the rich history that is now only available in two-dimensions – through reading materials or the internet.

The event allows for all of your senses to become active while you march with your friends and families through the history of the civilized world. We've Lost a Good Friend - Colonel John E. Ford

Although Colonel Ford was not a member of our Chapter, he was an active member of the Commander-in-Chief's Guards, and in spite of a seven year long battle with cancer, he remained very active up until his passing on August 13th. John's dedication to his Church, his Country and the SAR was an example for all of us.

John was a highly decorated Air Force officer, having served for thirty-seven years. During the Vietnam War he commanded a Combat Camera Detachment, and flew 124 combat missions. During Desert Storm he served on Gen. Norman Schwarzkopf's operations staff and was commander of all combat camera forces in Iraq.

John retired to Redlands, and became active in the Redlands Chapter, SAR, serving two terms as President.

For four years he served as Senior Advisor for the Hemet High School JROTC, teaching his cadets to live by his maxim, "Service before self".

In addition, he was past chairman of the Board, Memorial Honor Detail, Riverside National Cemetery.

John's dedication to the Color Guard was extraordinary. He was always available for parades, reenactments, encampments and school presentations, in spite of debilitating treatments for his illness.

In addition to a chest full of Military medals, John was the recipient of the California Society, SAR's Bronze, Silver and Gold Von Steuben Color Guard Medal. At his internment at the Riverside National Cemetery, a dozen SAR Guardsmen provided an honor guard.

He is survived by his wife Sherry and daughter Shonna. He will be missed.



Heroines of the American Revolution Lydia Barrington Darragh

Lydia Barrington was born in Dublin in 1729 to an Anglo-Irish family, who came to Ireland during the Elizabethan era. She was educated, and in fact, married her tutor, William Darragh. Like many Quakers, they migrated to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania where religious freedom was much better than in intolerant British controlled Ireland. They arrived in America in 1753. William continued his occupation as a teacher, while Lydia worked as a nurse, midwife and later a mortician.

Lydia like Betsy Ross were both Quakers who supported the cause of American Independence. Both were expelled from their Quaker meeting because of

their support for the war. Their place in American history is often challenged because there is no absolute evidence to support their Revolutionary War activities. In the case of both women, a family member brought each one's contribution to the cause to the attention of their fellow citizens...

In Lydia Darragh's case, it was her daughter Ann who made public the account of her mother's actions, thirty-eight years after Lydia died. Some historians have dismissed her story as an outright concocted tale or better stated, 'family legend'. There is no documentary evidence to support the story, however, reviewing the facts reveals that at

White Marsh, General George Washington's Army was well prepared, completely 'dug in' and not in the least surprised by British General William Howe's attempt on their position - - they had to have been warned.

When the British occupied Philadelphia on September 26th, 1777, Lydia was living on Second Street. The home of her neighbor John Cadwalader (1742-1786) was occupied by General Howe and used as his headquarters

during the occupation. (John Cadwalader, was a General in the Pennsylvania Militia and was heavily involved in the Trenton, Princeton campaign, and would play a significant part in the Whitemarsh.)

Shortly after the British arrived, Major John Andre (The British officer convicted of being General Benedict Arnold's contact, and hung in 1780) knocked on Lydia's door and ordered her to move out of the house so that it could be used by British officers. Lydia explained that she had

two children to take care of and no place to go. She had already sent her two youngest children to stay with relatives. She decided to visit Lord Howe personally and ask for his permission to remain in her house. On the way, she met a British officer who turned out to be a second cousin, Captain Barrington, from Ireland.

The Captain intervened, and at his request Lydia was allowed to stay in her home providing she kept a room available for British officers to hold meetings.

On the night of December 2nd, her house served as a conference center for top British Officers. The officers listened attentively as Lieutenant General Howe laid out his plans for a major offensive against George Washington and his army encamped at Whitemarsh. The surprise attack was to take place on December 4th. General Howe, learned from his network of loyalist spies, that Washington intended on leaving Whitemarsh and moving further away from Philadelphia in an attempt to avoid the possibil-

ity of being surprised. Howe wanted to catch Washington before he moved out of reach.

Lydia Darragh, overheard the discussion, and realized the British officers were planning an offensive against the Americans at Whitemarsh. Her own son, Charles, was in the American Army, and was serving with the 2nd Pennsylvania Regiment of the Continental Line, hence her own son's safety was at risk. She positioned herself in a linen closet next to the meeting room so she could hear better. When the meeting was adjourned, Lydia sneaked back to her bedroom and feigned sleep.

Major Andre knocked on the door at two different intervals, but she did not respond. On his third knock, she opened the door and he told her the officers were through with their meeting.

Lydia Darragh had only two days to warn General Washington at Whitemarsh of the pending attack. She conceived a plan. She went to Howe's headquarters and requested a pass from her cousin, Captain Barrington to go and get flour at a mill in Frankford. The request itself was not that unusual, as the poor were frequently given passes to purchase goods in the countryside.

Lydia started early on the morning of the 3rd carrying an empty flour sack. She had to walk several miles through snow before arriving at the Rising Sun Tavern, which was north of the city. According to her daughter, Ann, shortly before she reached the tavern she encountered Colonel Thomas Craig, of the 2nd

Pennsylvania Regiment and who knew her son Charles.

She passed on the information she overheard of the British plans to him, who promised he would take it to General Washington himself.

is told by Elias Boudinot, who was serving as Commissary of Prisoners, and was having dinner at the Rising Sun Tavern, He noted in his journal: "After Dinner, a little poor looking insignificant old woman came in and solicited leave to go into the Country to buy some flour - - While we were asking some Questions, she walked up to me and put into my hands a dirty old needle book, with various small pockets in it." Boudinot told the woman to wait for the answer to her request, but she left in the interim. Boudinot poked through the book failing to find anything useful until he got to the last

pocket where he "found a piece

of paper rolled up into the form

of a pipe shank. On unrolling it I found information that General Howe was coming out the next morning with 5,000 men, 13 pieces of cannon, baggage wagons, and 11 boat on wheels. On comparing this with other information, I found it true and immediately rode post to head-auarters."

Although the two stories differ in many details, particularly who transferred the message to Washington, the basic story is the same - Lydia Darragh warned General Washington. Either story becomes believable when you consider the British opinion on the subject. It was obvious to the British that the Americans had been well-prepared for their attack and further

knew when they were coming. George Washington had been alerted to the pending attack.

The British were looking for the spy. Several sus-

pects were questioned including Lydia Darragh. On December 9th, Major Andre, who was responsible for intelligence gathering for General Howe, approached Lydia Darragh and asked her if anyone had been up on the night of the 2th She told Andre that everyone had been asleep early. Andre either believed her or realized he could not prove her or her families involvement.

He left saying, "One thing is certain the enemy had notice of our coming, were prepared for us, and we marched back like a parcel of fools. The

walls must have ears."

The Quaker midwife had outwitted the British spy master and possibly saved George Washington's Army.

The Battle of Whitemarsh

After the Battle of Germantown, on October 4th, 1777 George Washington's army moved to Whitemarsh, Pennsylvania,

approximately 13 miles northwest of Philadelphia.

In early December, British commander General William Howe decided to make one last attempt to destroy Washington's army before winter set in. He began preparations for the attack on the American forces who he learned were about to move to a new encampment, further away and out of his reach.

Washington became aware of British plans to surprise him thanks to a

patriot women named Lydia Darragh. The Continental Army was ready when Howe marched out of Philadelphia, with a force of approximately 14,000 men at midnight on December 4th. The advance column, led by General Lord Cornwallis, headed up Germantown Pike. A second column led by General Knyphausen marched toward the American left.

Early in the morning of December 5th Cornwallis' column was observed at Chestnut Hill, three miles to the right of the American front, where they were fired upon by a patrol led by Captain Allen McLane. Washington sent out Brigadier-General James Irvine and 600 Pennsylvania troops to counter Cornwallis. In the

action that followed, Irvine was wounded and taken prisoner. A series of skirmishes were fought on December 6th and 7th, as the

British forces constantly probed the American lines for a weakness in their defenses, only to be repulsed by Washington and his troops. Colonel Joseph Reed and General John Cadwalader became separated from the American lines and were cut off by a detachment of Hessians. The two were rescued by Captain McLane and his cavalry, the very men that had fired the opening shots of the engagement one day earlier. On December 7th,

Howe tried to turn the American left flank. Washington counter attacked with Colonel Daniel Morgan's corps of riflemen and Mordecai Gist's Maryland militia. After some intense skirmish actions both forces withdrew

The following day, Howe and his troops abandoned the engagement and returned to Philadelphia. The Americans suffered ninety killed or wounded, including twenty-seven of Morgan's men. Sixteen or seventeen men from the Maryland militia and Major Joseph Morris of the First New Jersey Regiment. Thirtytwo Americans were captured.

The British casualties were sixty killed or wounded.

> In spite of Berni's battle with a neck medal, the event was very beneficial and much was learned.




